Tenwek School of Nursing Poised for Growth



The School of Nursing, which is accredited by the Nursing Council of Kenya, has been given permission to expand to 40 students per year.

Tenwek's School of Nursing provides an exceptional nursing education to 80 enrolled students annually. The program, which requires three and one-half years of study to complete, grants diplomas that qualify students for service as midwives, general nurses, or community health nurses. With Tenwek's five-year Master Plan envisioning the addition of 200 beds, the need for qualified and committed nurses has never been greater. The growth of the hospital will necessarily demand a growth in the number of nursing professionals qualified to serve.

Currently each year, 20 new students are accepted to the program to replace the graduating students. The School of Nursing, which is accredited by the Nursing Council of Kenya, has been given permission to expand to 40 students per year. Training is delivered by 12 faculty members in a cyclical pattern: students attend classroom training for 13 weeks and then participate in a clinical rotation to practice what they have learned.

The current nursing school facilities include two classrooms; a laboratory with medical equipment and models for training; a library with medical volumes and three laptop computers available for online research; and

a modest housing unit with a kitchen and small common area for socializing. The 80 students share use of seven other laptop computers and the library is planning to add several more for research purposes.

Nursing school leaders hope to increase enrollment gradually by rotating in two groups of 20 students at different times in the year to reach the enrollment approved by the Nursing Council of Kenya. In the interim, they plan to increase enrollment to 30 students. The tuition cost for one student for the full program, including room and board, is \$5,937 in U.S. dollars. With some accepted students unable to meet that full expense, the school has established a revolving fund, sustained by donors, to assist students. There are no plans to increase tuition, but an existing budget deficit must be addressed.

The hospital has developed comprehensive plans for an addition to the nursing school that would include additional hostels, several new classrooms, and a larger kitchen/dining area to accommodate the expected growth in the program. FOT intends to spearhead fundraising for this project, as well as provide funding to meet tuition needs. More details will be announced soon.

and share that experience with our children, Claire and Richard. This summer we made that dream a reality through the help of Samaritan's Purse, World Medical



I was pleasantly surprised to not see a single case of malaria, for when we were there before, so

many lives sadly were ended from that disease. I know education, bed nets, prayer, and determination made a huge difference in the community. What a blessing! Seeing a surgery residency program at Tenwek – as well as Kenyan medical stu-

dents and interns rotating through the many departments of Tenwek – is an amazing testimony of the great dedication of all the Tenwek long and short-term missionaries.

My children, Claire and Richard, really appreciated their time at Tenwek this summer. They experienced how others live and came away with a better understanding and appreciation for the gifts God gives them. Helping out on the wards and with the Tenwek community health program, they counted and packaged iron pills for pregnant Kenyan mothers, and went on numerous outings to far away communities weighing babies for well-baby visits and enjoying the children.


FOT Recognized as Non-Profit Charity by U.S. IRS; Announces *Sustaining Friends* Campaign

Friends of Tenwek has been granted 501(c)(3) status as a charitable organization by the Internal Revenue Service! This means FOT is able to directly solicit and receive donations that are deemed tax-deductible from our supporters. With this hurdle cleared, we are more focused than ever on building the Friends of Tenwek community. Over 6,000 Attend Children's Rally in Kericho

On August 10, 2013, the Africa Gospel Church (AGC) in affiliation with Tenwek Community Health and Development (TCHD), hosted a Children's Rally in Kericho, Kenya, based on the success of an earlier rally held in Bomet. The purpose of the event was to come alongside local churches to value, encourage, and support children's ministry and to promote a holistic ministry that helps churches see both the physical and spiritual needs of its people.

Based on pre-registration, area church leaders expected nearly 5,100 children to attend the Rally. However, the final number of children present totaled 6,321 and represented 300 churches. Jonathan Bii, director of TCHD, was thrilled at the attendance. "Thank God!" he exclaimed. "Despite schools being closed, we still had a lot of support from schools as well as churches."

Preparations for the Kericho Rally took three months of planning as well as more time invested in prayer and fundraising. AGC and TCHD worked in partnership with Carmel Baptist Church (North Carolina, US). In addition to the support of local churches, AGC was represented by the Assistant Bishop, Rev. David



Maritim, and National Children's Director Hellen Rutto.

The Rally featured singing and dancing from local youth groups, a puppet show, and, most importantly, the message of Jesus Christ. At the end of the teaching, over 1,000 children stood to respond to the invitation to accept Christ into their lives. Their hearts were softened to the call of the Spirit in their lives; praise God for that!



Prior to the Rally, 64 local church leaders received nine days of intensive training in order to counsel children through the decision of accepting Christ. The children

making decisions for Christ received counseling from these trained leaders. Each child's name and church was recorded for referral to home churches for continued follow-up. Because Christ not only wants us to become part of His family but desires us to know Him more, AGC is committed to disciple these children in order to encourage them to continue their walk with Him.


Despite the number of children in attendance and the number of souls that were saved, the day posed its challenges. Carmel Baptist Church had planned to send three representatives to the event but because of the devastating fire at the Nairobi airport, the team cancelled the trip, causing grief both in Kenya and North Carolina.

In addition, Hellen Rutto fell the morning of the event, causing team leaders to accompany her to the hospital for treatment of two facial lacerations. Praise God that she was treated quickly, allowing her to attend the event.

The Kericho Children's Rally is just the tip of the iceberg for the future of children's ministry in Kenya. Andrew Langat, financial coordinator for the rally, spoke candidly about the next steps for AGC and TCHD: "Our desire is that the churches learn to own this ministry for themselves so that we may praise with them rather than work for them."

Plans have been made to host another Rally in Nakuru on November 23, 2013. This really will focus on quality rather than quantity – to encourage discipleship and follow-up within the church communities. Carmel Baptist Church already has made plans to join AFC and TCHD for this event and, Lord willing, they will make the trip and be welcomed by their brothers and sisters in Kenya.

As praises are shared for a successful rally and plans for the next are commencing, the people of the Africa Gospel Church and Tenwek Community Health thank God in unison for a day of blessing shared with His children. As Andrew Langat expressed, "The purpose of this rally was to create awareness in the church to enhance children's ministry. We want to see a revival!"

FOT News and Notes

Ngito Water Bore Project Delayed by Drilling Problems



Earlier this year, FOT helped fund the initial drilling process for a water bore at the Ngito Dispensary. Unfortunately, after several attempts to drill – on occasion even reaching over 200 meters down – the drillers encountered bedrock. Over the two month period during which drilling was underway, two drill bits were destroyed. The contractor now is reviewing the land survey to determine

a new location for another drilling. Because of the problems encountered, the contractor has offered to pay for the next drill bit that will be needed.

A reliable supply of water at the dispensary compound is critical to its success – particularly since there are plans to make it the site of a small hospital for the area.


Construction of New Eye/ Dental Building at Tenwek

Tenwek's Eye Department continues to be one of the most proactive departments in terms of evangelism and missions. Dr. Ben Roberts recently traveled with some of his staff to South Sudan where they performed cataract surgeries. Tenwek is moving forward with plans to construct a new building on the hospital campus that will be dedicated to eye and dental care, two urgent areas of health care in Kenya.

The hospital is soliciting bids from at least five contractors for the building project and is on track to break ground for the facility in February 2014. An American contractor from California, whose wife has served at Tenwek as a surgeon in the past, has agreed to come to Tenwek and help with the construction project. Hospital administrators are still awaiting word on the status of the Phase 2 grant they have requested through the American Schools and Hospitals Abroad program of USAID. In the meantime, Dr. Roberts continues to raise funds for Phase 1 of the project; approximately \$170,000 is still needed.

HMIS Launches with Immediate Impact




Tenwek's new Health Management Information System is now serving Tenwek's outpatient and emergency departments with full implementation hospital-wide expected by year's end. The wireless laptop system has made a tremendous difference in the hospital's ability to efficiently manage its finance and billing systems. It has helped physicians and staff demonstrate to sometimes skeptical patients that there is no favoritism in how patient care is delivered. The use of electronic records has increased efficiency, reduced patient waiting times, and eliminated lost files. These milestone achievements are appreciated by Tenwek's young Kenyan staff and patients, who are enthusiastic about the improvements.

The expense for creating the new system, however, has been substantial. The project required ten times more customization than anticipated. FOT has pledged \$140,000 for the HMIS project; to date, \$25,000 has been provided to Tenwek. The balance of funds needed to meet the project's \$466,000 total budget have been coming directly from the hospital's operating budget and cash reserves as bills are received. Tenwek administrators have been willing to use reserves because completing the project is critical to maintain the patient care improvements and financial records momentum that has been achieved.

FOT is soliciting contributions to provide another installment of the remaining \$115,000 funds pledged to Tenwek for this important project. A cash infusion to the project now would provide significant relief to Tenwek during a very challenging budget year at the hospital. Your consideration of this urgent need is greatly appreciated.
